ASSESSMENT METHODS	Oral examination based alsoon the discussion of a paper written by the student on a topic chosen together with the teacher (the student is free to write or not a paper).
EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES	The general aim of the course is to improve critical skills of the student by analysing the role of persuasion in the construction and /or dissolution of social bonds. Starting from this general objective, we will provide the student with the basic skills and the necessary philosophical tools for a critical approach to the (written and oral) argumentative texts with persuasive purposes. To achieve these objectives, we will mainly focuse on "Rhetoric" of Aristotle, by including it in the broader context of Aristotleian philosophy and in the contemporary debate on the theory of argumentation. During the lectures we will schedule guided reading of the text (by comparing the translation with the original text) in order to improve the students' skills of analysing philosophical texts. The course also includes the active participation of students, in particular guided classroom discussions and presentation of parts of the text analyzed. In this way we will try to pursue the objective of strengthening the communication skills and the critical thinking of the student.
