PREREQUISITES	Required is basic knowledge of the history of philosophy, with particular attention to the formation of subject idea in the modern age.

ASSESSMENT METHODS	Oral assessment The final oral assessment is a viva in which knowlwdge and skills in the field of study "Philosophical Ermeneutics" are going to be tested. They are: the acquisition of advanced tools for the comprehension of the texts, the in-depth knowledge of the historical period and the historical-cultural context in which the philosophies of Descartes and Pascal carry out their thinking action. Final pass marks go from 18 to 30 points cum laude. The student is required to answer at least 2 or 3 oral questions regarding the whole program of study with reference to the suggested books. Questions shall assess a) the student's autonomous comparison with the philosophical text, knowlesge and understanding, the ability to organize their ideas in a coherent and appropriate way to the study context b) the ability to process and interpret critical issues of hermeneutic nature c) ability to communicate; d) making judgements. EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES	responsibility for completion of tasks in work or study. Aim of the course titled "The place of the subject between identity and conflict" is to address the genesis of the modern subject in Pascal, a genesis that has its theoretical key within a rationality converted to love. This implies a necessary reference to Descartes who remains the modern philosopher contemporary of Pascal most representative for this question. The dissonance between Descartes and Pascal will be amplified and made clear by reading of Jean-Luc Marion'book "The erotic phenomenon", that goes on with the Pascal plant, looks at an identity approach that finds its theoretical guide in the erotic phenomenon. The reading of Descartes and Pascal texts will be made in Italian and in French, respecting one of the prerogatives of the Course of Studies in Philosophical and Historical Sciences and will contribute, for the attention paid to the philosophical text, to develop the logical-argumentative abilities and the ability to interpret and criticize problems in a way consistent with the training objectives of the Course of Study. The topic chosen for lessons can be considerate as the theme of interdepartmental research "Identity and Conflict".
