DOCENTE: Prof. MARCO ANDREA MANNO PREREQUISITES Knowledge and competence regarding: a) the meaning of some fundamental philosophical and political-philosophical categories (e.g.: authority, power, sovereignty, obedience, resistance, borders/ frontiers) b) the meaning of some fundamental categories of the general theory of law and state (e.g.: government, state, law, rights, sanction) KNOWLEDGE AND UNDERSTANDING: the course aims at providing students LEARNING OUTCOMES with a knowledge of criminology's principles, methods and fundamental contents, as well as at stimulating their ability to understand the links between processes of criminalization, punitive practices and the social, political and legal system. APPLYING KNOWLEDGE AND UNDERSTANDING: the course is aimed at providing students with the ability to apply their criminological knowledge to the analysis of criminal phenomena, of social dynamics of criminalization and reaction to crime, as well as to current trends in criminal policy. MAKING JUDGEMENTS: the course aims at providing students with the ability: to make autonomous evaluations of the social, political and legal dynamics of criminalization and criminogenesis; to grasp the relationships between deviance and society; to make comparative evaluations between different criminological approaches; to critically argue as regards the grounds, the meaning and the consequences of punitive practices. COMMUNICATION SKILLS: the course aims at providing students with the ability to argue by applying criminological notions. LEARNING SKILLS: the course aims at providing students with the ability to understand the relationships between the empirical dimension and the socionormative constructions of criminality, as well as the meaning and the consequences of punitive social practices. ASSESSMENT METHODS Oral exam. The oral exam consists of an interview aimed at ascertaining the candidate's knowledge of the topics in the syllabus. The interview consists of a minimum of three questions. Positive evaluation of the exam will be provided on a scale ranging from 18 to 30 cum laude points. Questions will be aimed at ascertaining: 1) the candidate's knowledge of the topics in the syllabus; 2) his/her ability to use and apply the learned notions, as well a sto relate them each other; 3) his/her ability to use appropriately criminology's language and concepts. The evaluation will take place 'in conformity' to the following evaluation grid: - Excellent (30-30 cum laude): excellent knowledge of the topics in the syllabus, excellent ability to use the criminology's technical language, excellent capacity of analysis; excellent ability to apply theoretical knowledge to real cases which are proposed to be analysed: excellent ability to properly argue possible solutions, including multiple alternatives. - Very good (26-29): very good knowledge of the topics in the syllabus, very good ability to use the criminology's technical language, very good capacity of analysis; very good ability to apply theoretical knowledge to real cases which are proposed to be analysed; very good ability to properly argue possible solutions, including multiple alternatives. - Good (24-25): good knowledge of the topics in the syllabus, good ability to use the criminology's technical language, with a certain ability to apply theoretical knowledge to real cases which are proposed to be analysed. - Satisfactory (21-23): satisfactory knowledge of the topics in the syllabus; satisfactory ability to use the criminology's technical language, albeit with a poor ability to adequately apply theoretical knowledge to real cases which are proposed to be analyzed. - Sufficient (18-20): basic knowledge of the main teaching; basic ability to use the criminology's technical language; limited or no capacity to adequately apply theoretical knowledge to real cases which are proposed to be analyzed. - Insufficient outcome: the student does not have an acceptable knowledge of the topics in the syllabus. **EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES** The course aims at equipping students with a knowledge of criminology's principles, methods and crucial topics (where by "criminology" is to be meant the empirical study of both crime and criminalization, as well as of their relationships with social and legal systems). It also aims at providing students with a knowledge of the individual, social and legal mechanisms of criminalization, as well as with a theoretical understanding of the most relevant theoretical approaches either explaining or justifying punishment by states.
