ASSESSMENT METHODS	<p>a) The evaluation of the expected results will take place through an oral test + a written test. However, since the tests in progress in non-compulsory courses cannot be compulsory, for the purposes of the final assessment students who wish to undergo the on-going test for the purposes of the final assessment must report it to the teacher at the beginning.</p> <p>b) The written test will consist of a commentary on a literary text. It will be assessed in thirtieths and, at the discretion of the student, will average with the evaluation of the oral exam expressed in thirtieths.</p> <p>c) The oral exam will consist of questions aimed at ascertaining historical-literary knowledge, expressive skills (written and oral), synthesis skills, critical restitution of topics, and commentary on the text</p> <p>Taxonomy: does not pass the exam: knowledge seriously incomplete; very poor language skills; very poor analysis and comment skills 18-22 / 30: elementary knowledge; just enough language skills; analytical skills just enough 23-26 / 30: sufficient knowledge; correct linguistic skills but not extensive and diversified; basic analytical skills 27-30 / 30: solid, extensive and in-depth knowledge; varied linguistic abilities on multiple registers, ample and correct; good analytical skills LODE: excellent knowledge; excellent expressive skills; excellent analytical skills</p>

PREREQUISITES	BASIC KNOWLEDGE OF THE HISTORY OF ITALIAN LITERATURE. AN INTEREST IN AND A PROPENSITY FOR THE READING AND THE ANALYSIS OF LITERARY TEXTS.
LEARNING OUTCOMES	Knowledge and comprehension. At the end of the course, the student will have a general knowledge of the fundamental moments in the history of the Italian literature from its origins to the XVth century. Ability to apply knowledge and comprehension. The student has a thorough knowledge of the Italian literary tradition in its historical development and is able to understand, analyze and critically interpret the texts, by means of a wide methodological competence. Autonomy of judgement. The student is able to express judgements on literary texts with autonomy. Communicative abilities. The student will be able to communicate the acquired skills, utilizing an adequate and clear language. Learning ability. The student will be able to adequately utilize the essential methodological tools in order to evaluate, in the analysis of a text, the thematic, historical-cultural and stylistic aspects.
ASSESSMENT METHODS	The final evaluation will be the outcome of the arithmetic average of the written test and oral test. The oral test consists in an oral interview which has the aim of evaluating the critical and methodological ability of the students. The exam will ensure the preparation of the students, considering both the historical literary knowledge of the authors in the program and the skills of textual analysis. Regarding the evaluation criteria we will assign: 30 and 30 with honors to those who show excellent argumentative skills, explanatory clarity, literary contextualization and formal analysis skills. From 27 to 29 for those who have a good literary historical preparation and coherent exposure. From 24 to 26 for those who have clear the guidelines of the literary scene but not enough depth. From 18 to 24 for those who show a limited preparation and lack of clarity of the works in the program.
EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES	The object of the course is to help students form an adequate methodology for approaching literary texts and a suitable knowledge of some significant works of the Italian literary patrimony from its Origins to the XVTH Century, and also of the development of literary genres. The study of such a chronological period is intended to provide students with a complete and non-segmented vision of the history of the Italian Literature.
