PREREQUISITES The prerequisite are those assessed through the admission test **LEARNING OUTCOMES** Knowledge and understanding Knowledge of the main theoretical approaches and research areas in cultural anthropology (social, economic, political and symbolic systems) concerning the relationship between individuals and society; ability of understanding social transformations in a cross-disciplinary perspective. Applying knowledge and understanding Ability of reading and interpreting a "text" in the broadest sense. **Making Judgements** Understanding the variety of views involved in different representations of reality and their historically and culturally determined nature, in order to foster more articulated and complex interpretations. Communication Ability to communicate to experts as well as to a more general audience the relevant implications of the topics and problems involved in anthropologically oriented historical research. Lifelong learning skills Ability to apply the anthropologist's toolbox to the investigation of topics of historical interest, in a cross-disciplinary perspective. ASSESSMENT METHODS Mid-term evaluation: Written test on case studies. Students who will pass the written test, do not present the case studies for final written assessment. All other students who will not pass the text or who are not able to attend lessons will present all the course programme. Final written assessment: The written assessment is a test consisting in: 3 essay questions from Robbins and 1 essay question from the second book, for students who have passed the previous mid-term assessment; 4 essay questions from Robbins and 1 from the second book, for students who have not taken and/or passed the mid-term assessment. Final pass marks go from 18 to 30 points cum laude. All questions will concern the contents of the books in the course programme, including the boxes called "Approfondimento". The written test is valid, and therefore it will be evaluated, only a) if the student will answer three questions out four (at least 2 from Robbins, 1 from the other book) for students who have passed the mid-term assessment, b) four answers (at least 3 from Robbins, 1 from the other book) for the other students. 	Students will be introduced to the main issues of the discipline, discussing with a critical attitude key-notions such as tradition vs modernity, permanence vs change, etc. They will also be led to analyse the contribution made by anthropology to the knowledge of social and cultural constructions, as well as of the "logics" underlying them, in order to understand how a "text" is produced, in a historically and ideologically determined way, and the different views it conveys.
TEACHING METHODS	Students attend lessons according to the calendar on website Unipa. Students who are not able to attend lessons, can contact the professor to ask her any question related to any topic of the course. Frontal teaching Guided discussion on the proposed texts Although teaching is based on frontal lectures, these are delivered in an interactive mode. Besides being able of asking any time for clarifications or for further explanations, students will be required to present case studies that will be the topic of intermediate valuation test. They will also take part in guided discussion on mouvies and/or documentaries.
