ASSESSMENT METHODS	ONGOING EVALUATION written and Oral assessment: in both written and oral exam the knowledge and skills in the field of study are going to be tested. In each exam notes go from 18 to 30 points and the final voting results from the average. In each exam the student is required to answer at least 2 or 3 questions regarding the whole program of study with reference to the suggested books. Questions shall assess a) Knowlesge and understanding b) cognitive and practical skills c) ability to communicate; d) making judgements. Pursuing this objective, we will particularly focus on few questions concerning, in the contemporary debate, the notions of "person", "common good", "communicative action" according to the aims of the Degree course in "Educazione di Comunità". At the same time, we will try to develop, addressing key philosophical issues, an intellectual and human training based on critical attitude, ability for in-depth analysis, openness to dialogue and sensitivity to social-pedagogical approach.

ASSESSMENT METHODS	Oral assessment The final oral assessment is a viva in which knowlwdge and skills in the field of study "Theoretical philosophy"" are going to be tested. They are: the acquisition of advanced tools for the comprehension of the texts, the in-depth knowledge of the historical period and the historical-cultural context relevant to the authors in the program.  Final pass marks go from 18 to 30 points cum laude.  Non-attending students can arrange a modified program with the professor. The student is required to answer at least 2 or 3 oral questions regarding the whole program of study with reference to the suggested books. Questions shall assess a) the student's autonomous comparison with the philosophical text, knowlesge and understanding, the ability to organize their ideas in a coherent and appropriate way to the study context b) the ability to process and interpret critical issues of hermeneutic nature c) ability to communicate; d) making judgements.
