Final assessment aims to evaluate whether the student has knowledge and understanding of the topics as well as he/she has acquired the capacity to interpret and independent judgment of concrete cases.</p> <p>The mark will be sufficient (between 18/30 and 21/30) and will be reached when the student shows basic knowledge and sufficient understanding of the subjects at least in general terms; he/she will also have sufficient presentation and argumentative skills as to allow the transmission of his/her knowledge to the examiner. An average mark (between 22/30 and 26/30) and will be reached when the student shows good knowledge and good understanding of the subjects; he/she will also have good presentation and argumentative skills as to allow the transmission of his/her knowledge to the examiner. The mark will be excellent (between 27/30 and 29/30) and will be reached when the student shows excellent knowledge and excellent understanding of the subjects; he/she will also have excellent presentation and argumentative skills as to allow the transmission of his/her knowledge to the examiner. Mark will be 30/30 cum laude if objectives will be optimally reached. Grades are expressed in thirtieths. Students who attend the course could, during the suspension of lessons, take a structured written exam.
