| ASSESSMENT METHODS | Oral assessment The final oral assessment is a viva in which knowlwdge and skills in the field of study "Contemporary hermeneutics" are going to be tested. They are: the acquisition of advanced tools for the comprehension of the texts, the in-depth knowledge of the historical period and the historical-cultural context relevant to the authors in the program. Final pass marks go from 18 to 30 points cum laude. |
| | Non-attending students can arrange a modified program with the professor. The student is required to answer at least 2 or 3 oral questions regarding the whole program of study with reference to the suggested books. Questions shall assess a) the student's autonomous comparison with the philosophical text, knowlesge and understanding, the ability to organize their ideas in a coherent and appropriate way to the study context b) the ability to process and interpret critical issues of hermeneutic nature c) ability to communicate; d) making judgements. | EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES | The aim of the course entitled "Forms of the negative" is the deepening of the role of negation within the philosophical discourse. Two contemporary positions will be examined: the "negative certainty" of Jean-Luc Marion, which has as its goal the theoretical status of what goes beyond the common phenomenality and which is given as a gift / donation, and the "retraction" of Leonardo Samonà, considered from the latter the profound essence of metaphysics and an inclusive reading key of philosophy. |
