PREREQUISITES	Basic knowledge of mathematical tools as cartesian axis, line equation. However, these tools will be refreshed at the beginning of the course.
LEARNING OUTCOMES	1) Knowledge and understanding At the end of the course the students will acquire knowledge of the key concepts and of basic models of micro- and macroeconomic theory, and will be able to understand the arguments proposed in any university textbook at the introductory and intermediate level.
	2) Applying knowledge and understanding At the end of the course students will be able to develop a professional approach to the cultural work and will possess adequate competences both to conceive and support topics and to solve problems in the socio-economic fields of study.

	At the end of the course students will have acquired the capacity to gather and interpret data and results in order to express autonomous judgments on socioeconomic issues related to the cultural operator profession.

ASSESSMENT METHODS	Written exam and facultative oral exam.
	The evaluation of the written exam is in 30/30. The written exam takes 2 hours and consists of a number of questions. Those questions are partly open and partly multiple choices. Each answer is evaluated by a score on a 0-55 scale. The written exam aims at ascertain the understanding of the topics included in the syllabus. The student may be requested to include graphics in the answers. Rigor and clarity in the exposition will contribute to the evaluation.
	The student, after the evaluation of the written exam, has the possibility to take
	an oral exam. The criteria for the evaluation are the same as for the written exam. The Commission, in case of a largely insufficient written exam, has the faculty of advising the student not to take the oral exam.
EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES	The course in Economics aims at providing the students the capacity to master the main analytical tools developed in the contemporary micro- and macroeconomic theory, aiming at explaining the functioning of a market economy as well as its main problems, the so-called market failures. Furthermore, some practical applications will be presented which aim to acquire a critical understanding of the relationships between contemporary and the past economic processes.
TEACHING METHODS	- 30 hours of frontal lessons- 4 hours of seminar activities.
