DOCENTE: Prof.ssa LUCIANA PEPI PREREQUISITES Required is basic knowledge of Judaism. **LEARNING OUTCOMES** ECTS credits for this course are awarded to students who: Knowledge and understanding: • have demonstrated knowledge and understanding that is founded upon and extends and/or enhances that typically associated with the first cycle, and that provides a basis or opportunity for originality in developing and/or applying ideas, often within a research context; Applying knowledge and understanding: • can apply their knowledge and understanding, and problem solving abilities in new or unfamiliar environments within broader (or multidisciplinary) contexts related to their field of study; Making judgements: • have the ability to integrate knowledge and handle complexity, and formulate judgements with incomplete or limited information, but that include reflecting on social and ethical responsibilities linked to the application of their knowledge and judgements: have the learning skills to allow them to continue to study in a manner that may be largely self-directed or autonomous. Oral assessment: ASSESSMENT METHODS The oral assessment is a viva in which knowledge and skills in the field of study are going to be tested. Final notes go from 18 to 30 points. The student is required to answer at least 2 or 3 oral questions regarding the whole program of study with reference to the suggested books. Questions shall assess a) Knowlesge and understanding b) cognitive and practical skills c) ability to communicate; d) making judgements. Non-attending students will have to agree with the teacher on the texts and topics that will be discussed during the final exam **EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES** The course aims at providing the main historical, bibliographic and critical tools in order to help the students to understand overall ancient and middle age Hebrew thought, so to enable them to take part in the contemporary debate. The tight relationship between Hebrew, ancient Greek and Arab-Islamic thought will be investigated. Some major themes of ancient and middle age Hebrew literature will be debated, such as faith-religion relationship, rational reflection on God, man and nature, the centrality of ethics, free will, social and political dimensions, theory and practice relationship in orthopraxis. Students will find

Students will find out how ancient texts such as Torah and Talmud have been transposed in modern and contemporary times, with a special focus on the contribution of Judaism in the western culture.
