PREREQUISITES	In order to attend the course, the student should know the basic aspects of Italian culture and literary tradition, in the context of European culture: its historical development (from Stilnovo to postmodern), the works, the authors and the most significant literary currents, the main genres of the tradition and their expressive codes.
LEARNING OUTCOMES	<p>At the end of the course the student will have acquired a thorough knowledge of the authors, works, genres, themes, issues and movements of Italian literature from the thirteenth century to the Renaissance, in the framework of Western civilization. He/she will also read analytically works or parts of them in the context of the Italian literary canon.</p> <p>Ability to apply knowledge and understanding: At the end of the course the student will have achieved the ability to recognize, interpret and frame the works and the issues dealt with historically. He will also be able to use the knowledge acquired to address specific critical and literary problems in relation to which he will be able to formulate and argue exegesis proposals, also with the support of bibliographic tools.</p> <p>Making judgments: At the end of the course the student will be able to independently interpret the critical judgments and the literary historiography on the authors and the topics dealt with; he will also know how to elaborate independent judgments on literary texts, interpreting them with the help of the critical tools (metric, rhetorical, linguistic, historical, hermeneutical) acquired in the course.</p> <p>Communication skills: At the end of the course, the student will be able to communicate information, to present issues and problems related to the field of study in question, both in oral and written form, to specialists and non-specialist interlocutors.</p> <p>Learning skills: At the end of the course the student will be in possession of solid basic knowledge, autonomous capacity for critical re-elaboration in the use of the acquired tools, the ability to identify and elaborate study paths both in the professional field and in the eventual continuation of the magisterial studies.</p>
ASSESSMENT METHODS	<p>The assessment is divided into two phases: a written test and an oral interview. The written test consists of a questionnaire of six open-ended questions on the general part of the course (the signs and the reference texts will be listed in the program); the duration of the test is three hours (in presence), an hour and a half (on line). In the oral examination, the applicant must answer two / three questions on the focus and on the classic chosen to be read in full (entries and reference books will be listed in the program). Each final note goes from 18 to 30 points (each questionnaire response will be assigned a score from 0 to 6); the final evaluation goes from 18 to 30 points: The final evaluation is obtained from the weighted average of the results of the written test (which is 2/3 of the total) and the oral exam (which is 1/3 of the total). Purpose of the assessment is to assess the skills and disciplinary knowledge provided by the course and check presentation skills (recognize and describe a text in program, contextualize works and authors, know form and content of the texts, historically interpret and frame works and issues; communicate information and expose issues using the appropriate language ...). EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES	Educational objective of the course is to provide: - a solid basic education, methodological and historical, of Italian literary culture in the broader context of European literary culture; - An adequate knowledge of Italian literature of the Middle Ages and the modern age in its historical development, by direct analysis

	<p>of the literary works and of the main criticisms and interpretations; - A satisfactory knowledge of the methods of analysis and interpretation. The course also aims at making acquire the ability to critically understand and contextualize literary phenomena, through the study of literary specificity, history of the reception of the texts, conflict of interpretations. Literary hermeneutics and interpretation of texts, therefore, will also go practiced in order to train the student to self-manage and transmit knowledge and to cultural mediation. Specifically, the first of two modules of the course aims to provide skills on literary activity in Italy and on the main issues relating to it and a good knowledge of the main works of the national canon. The second module, through the whole critical reading of a classic chosen by the student among those proposed, and the deepening of a critical issue, aims to consolidate an adequate autonomy in evaluation and problematization of the aesthetic, cultural and political issues that literary texts pose. The course, therefore, aims at defining a satisfactory professional profile, that allow the graduate the realization of coherent and informed choices for a possible continuation of the Master's studies.</p>
TEACHING METHODS	Frontal teaching (or remote teaching in case of emergency); exercises on the texts; guided discussion on the proposed texts. There will be a test in progress. Students are recommended to register for the course by unipa portal to view alerts and download the materials.

PREREQUISITES	The Italian Literature course prepares for the knowledge of the general lines of literature from XII to XVI century. PREREQUISITES necessary: in line with the profile of students leaving high school, the course requires: - written and oral linguistic-expressive mastery; - skills in reading, comprehension, analysis and commentary on the literary text
LEARNING OUTCOMES	<p>KNOWLEDGE: clear and in-depth knowledge of forms, genres and literary issues from XII to XVI century. Clear and in-depth knowledge of the themes, of the philological-linguistic and historical-literary issues of the scheduled works</p> <p>UNDERSTANDING CAPACITY: knowing how to report the contents of an author's and critical text in a smooth, correct and clear form</p> <p>CAPACITY TO APPLY KNOWLEDGE AND TO UNDERSTAND: knowing how to use the knowledge acquired in comparison with texts never read before but belonging to the same historical horizon studied. ASSESSMENT METHODS	<p>The evaluation of the expected results will take place through an oral test + a written test. However, since the tests in progress in non-compulsory courses cannot be compulsory, for the purposes of the final assessment students who wish to undergo the on-going test for the purposes of the final assessment must report it to the teacher at the beginning.</p> <p>b) The written test will consist of a commentary on a literary text. It will be assessed in thirtieths and, at the discretion of the student, will average with the evaluation of the oral exam expressed in thirtieths.</p> <p>c) The oral exam will consist of questions aimed at ascertaining historical-literary knowledge, expressive skills (written and oral), synthesis skills, critical restitution of topics, and commentary on the text</p> <p>Taxonomy: does not pass the exam: knowledge seriously incomplete; very poor language skills; very poor analysis and comment skills 18-22 / 30: elementary knowledge; just enough language skills; analytical skills just enough 23-26 / 30: sufficient knowledge; correct linguistic skills but not extensive and diversified; basic analytical skills 27-30 / 30: solid, extensive and in-depth knowledge; varied linguistic abilities on multiple registers, ample and correct; good analytical skills LODE: excellent knowledge; excellent expressive skills; excellent analytical skills</p>
EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES	The first year course of Italian Literature aims to consolidate a first basic knowledge of literary forms and genres, of expressive registers and formal codes from the Middle Ages to sixteenth century; aims to provide the first basic knowledge of the philology of texts (of copy and author), of the genesis and transmission of works, of tradition and innovation of literary forms, therefore, to acquire the tools of analysis and interpretation of the literary text through the direct comparison with the works both in integral and anthological reading
