PREREQUISITES	Knowledge of the Greek ancient language (dialects) and grammar, some meters (hexameter, elegiac couplet, iambic trimeter),
LEARNING OUTCOMES	<p>Knowledge and ability to understand: deep knowledge of the ancient Greek language, in its morphology and syntax, and in the sociological dimension of its vocabulary. Knowledge of the main historical and cultural phenomena that are related to the Greek texts ranging from the archaic age to the classical age and understanding of the relationship which exists between any theory and the world in which the theory itself developed. Knowledge of the main tools of investigation for research on the ancient Greek textual world.</p> <p>Capacity to apply knowledge and understanding: Capacity to recognize the morphological and syntactic structures of the Greek language and to translate ancient Greek texts. Capacity to place with arguments the information gained about the ancient world in general, and in particular the Greek texts, in their political and cultural horizon.</p> <p>Autonomous judgment: Awareness of the differences between the various interpretations of historical and cultural phenomena of the period which has been studied and ability to organize the new as a function of one's own transparent, explicit and dialoguing 'view of the world'.</p> <p>Communication skills: ability to express orally the discipline issues in a clear and orderly manner, with attention to problem complexity, to both specialist and nonspecialist audiences.</p> <p>Learning capability: criticism and self-criticism. Capability, awareness of inherent planning in general, in every problem setting (problem making), as well as in the proposed solution (problem solving), in order to be able to also undertake further studies with a larger degree of autonomy.</p>
ASSESSMENT METHODS	<p>1. oral exam in itinere; minimum three questions, on all topics and texts (grammar, translation and commentary) treated in the lessons up to that moment: the evaluation criteria will be the same as for the final oral exam (cf. 2.).</p> <p>2. final oral exam (minimum three questions).</p> <p>a) Excellent knowledge of the subjects, excellent mastery of language, good analytical capability, the student is able to apply knowledge to solve the proposed problems: 30-30 cum laude.</p> <p>b) Good mastery of the subjects, full mastery of language, the student is able to apply knowledge to solve the proposed problems: 26-29.</p> <p>c) Basic knowledge of the main subjects, fair mastery of language, with limited ability to apply independently the knowledge to the solution of the proposed problems: 24-25.</p> <p>d) the student does not have full mastery of the main subjects but he has the knowledge, satisfactory properties of language, lack of capacity to apply independently the acquired knowledge : 21-23.</p> <p>e) minimum basic knowledge of the main subjects and of the technical language, very little or no ability to apply independently the acquired knowledge: 18-20.</p> <p>f) the student does not have an acceptable knowledge of the subjects: insufficient.</p>
EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES	<p>The course aims to provide a clear depiction of the socio-cultural history of the ancient Greek 'literature' from the archaic age to the classical age and to show how the ancient texts can be read with respect to their historicity, 'other' in relation to ours and, together, within a cultural policy project. For this purpose, it will be conducted an analysis of some texts on a specific object, which will be supplied in photocopy.</p> <p>In general, I invite everyone to read and study on any topic and field of knowledge, and to go beyond the disciplinary specialization, in the name of culture, which is always an open field, requiring different knowledge, attention, listening skills (a lot of listening), curiosity, love of effort, desire to understand reflection (and the time necessary for it), awareness. In order to have an idea of one thing, I believe, it is fundamental to have an idea of many others as well, and to strive to connect them with each other and with oneself; in order to have an idea of the ancient Greek world, it is fundamental to have an conscious idea of today's world (with which one must compare it), to cultivate biology, physics, linguistics, anthropology, history, psychology, economics, epistemology ... and life. There are no human sciences or physical sciences: all sciences reflect human ways of seeing and ways of living.</p>
