LEARNING OUTCOMES	<p>KNOWLEDGE AND UNDERSTANDING Knowledge of the scientific approach to the study of human language and of the subfields; knowledge of the metalanguage; knowledge of the advantages that linguistic analyses allow for when used for the comprehension of social or individual phenomena; knowledge of some recent advancement in linguistics.</p> <p>APPLYING KNOWLEDGE AND UNDERSTANDING The student will be able to analyze a text in Italian (e.g. fiction, advertisement, poetry) and extract its main features concerning e.g. lexical choices, pronunciation, register. The student will also be able to spot some rhetorical instruments (e.g. metaphor, metonymy etc.). S/he will make phonetic and phonological transcriptions of Italian words and of words from other languages. S/he will be able to find the deep structure of the main clause types of Italian.</p> <p>MAKING JUDGEMENTS The student's ability to collect and interpret relevant linguistic data will allow him/her to make personal judgements on relevant social, ethical, and scientific issues.</p> <p>COMMUNICATION SKILLS The student will be able to communicate objective data, ideas, problems and solutions, as well as personal feelings and findings to both specialist and non-specialist audiences.</p> <p>LEARNING SKILLS The student will develop learning skills that are necessary for further study with a higher degree of autonomy.</p>
