EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES	 Demonstrate appreciation and understanding of literary, historical or visual primary texts in the reading list. Understand how these works are influenced by Puritanism, Illuminism and Transcendentalism. Demonstrate knowledge of the historical and cultural context in which American Literature began and of the ideologies and mechanisms involved in the construction of the American literary canon. Relate /connect the literary texts in the syllabus to the main ideas circulating in the American culture of the time:the centrality of individualism, the relationship between freedom and equality, the myth of American Exceptionalism, the ideas of democracy and cosmopolitanism, the dialectic between freedom and slavery, the ideology of domesticity, the aesthetics of the American "romance", the nature of the "American Reinassance" and others Interpret literary history in terms of Raymond Williams concepts of "dominant", "emergent", and "residual". Independently research (using the library or the web resources identified in class), identify, and negotiate with the tutor a topic or text for the final written assignment, showing the ability to choose and apply appropriate critical perspectives.
