LEARNING OUTCOMES	<p>Knowledge and understanding At the end of the course, learners will know and understand the issues relating to digital philology and to the role of Digital Scholarly Editions (DSE) in the modern world.</p> <p>Applying knowledge and understanding At the end of the course, students will be able to aptly discuss issues relating to the philological study of texts and to the preparation of Digital Scholarly Editions (DSE). They will also acquire the theoretical tools necessary to understand and evaluate a DSE.</p> <p>Autonomy of judgment At the end of the course, learners will be able to formulate autonomous judgments both on the issues relating to digital philology and the preparations of DSE.</p> <p>Communication skills At the end of the course, learners will be able to discuss, in a technically adequate manner, digital issues applied to textual criticism.</p> <p>Lifelong learning skills At the end of the course, learners will have developed the ability to further the study of issues relating to digital philology, and will be able to find new applications and research tools. They will also be able to attend a postgraduate course on the field.</p>
ASSESSMENT METHODS	<p>Oral exam. The oral exam will involve a dynamic, interactive discussion to ascertain the student's possession of the knowledge and skills meant to be acquired by attending the course. A minimum of three questions will be asked, and these will be specially designed to test the learning outcomes, with particular attention to: a) the knowledge acquired, b) the student's ability to apply the discipline's knowledge and methodology to specific cases, c) the ability to express concepts and ideas in a clear and accurate manner, making an appropriate use of the discipline's terminology. The highest mark will be obtained if the student demonstrates excellence in all three of these areas. The following grading system will be used: 30 and 30 cum laude: excellent knowledge of the course topics; excellent speaking abilities; good analytical abilities; the student is able to apply the knowledge acquired to specific cases. 26-29: good mastery of the course subjects; good speaking skills; the student is able to apply the knowledge acquired to specific cases. 24-25: basic knowledge of the main course topics; adequate speaking skills; limited ability to independently apply the knowledge acquired to specific cases. 20-23: the student does not have full command of the main topics of the course but he/she has acquired some of the knowledge required; acceptable speaking skills; poor ability to independently apply the knowledge acquired. 18-19: minimal knowledge of the main topics of the course and of the technical language; very little or no ability to independently apply the knowledge acquired. Failed: the student does not have an acceptable knowledge of the contents of the topics covered in the course.</p>
EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES	<p>The course aims to provide the student with knowledge of the methods and tools of digital philology and digital humanities. Moving from a basic knowledge of traditional textual criticism and of related palaeographic, codicological, historical, linguistic and cultural issues, the course will explore the application of digital technology to scholarly editions of texts - with particular attention to texts belonging to the medieval manuscript traditions of the Germanic area -, focusing also on their relevance in contemporary cultural discourse.</p>
