DOCENTE: Prof.ssa CRISTINA ROGNONI PREREQUISITES General knowledge of Roman Late Antiquity history and historiography; knowledge of the Greek language and literary tradition. **LEARNING OUTCOMES** Knowledge and understanding: Knowledge of the historical development of Byzantium, and comprehension of the related institutional, social and cultural aspects of its civilisation. Acquisition of the appropriate methodological skills and capacity to understand the main topics of the discipline. Ability to apply knowledge and understanding: Knowledge acquired should be applied to the study of textual sources and demonstrated through the critical analysis of bibliographic references. Critical awareness of knowledge issues: Critical awareness will be evaluated on the capacity to trace, read and comment on byzantine sources and modern bibliographical references. Communication skills: Ability to display research methods and acquired knowedge on the field of Byzantine studies using appropriate language tools. Learning skills: Ability to improve understanding of Byzantine studies through the correct methodological, analytical and critical presentation of the topics discussed by the course. ASSESSMENT METHODS Presentation of case-studies (orally or in written form) by the students during the course and final oral test. Final oral assessment: The discussion-based oral assessment aims to test all aspects of knowledge and skills in the field of study. Students who are not able to attend the course are required to give a presentation of a case study during the oral examination. During the oral examination, the students are required to answer at least 3 questions regarding the entire programme, with reference to the suggested reading list. The oral examination questions assess a) knowledge and understanding of the contents of the course b) familiarity with the sources and the existing literature c) communication skills d) critical evaluation. After acquiring the necessary knowledge in paleography and diplomatics as well as methodological and critical tools, students will be able to access directly the written sources and carry on to research in the field of byzantine studies; to work in higher education, cultural institutes, archives and libraries; to work in publishing; to engage in the preservation and transmission of cultural heritage. Meetings will be held on interdisciplinary questions in order to improve

coordination with other courses.
